

## **ANNUAL REPORT 2005**

ur report for 2005 can be summed up as, "Hip hip hooray for CLAM's first housing project!" We're delighted with this first big step toward our vision of housing that working people can afford in the communities surrounding Tomales Bay. Read on for more about CLAM's major activities and accomplishments in 2005. This was our third year pursuing our mission with an active volunteer board, several members who are active volunteers, and a part-time paid staff (14 hours per week).

## **First Property Acquisition**

On August 18, 2005 CLAM completed the purchase of our first property, a three-bedroom house just north of the commercial area in Inverness Park. This success is the culmination of our work since CLAM's founding in 2001 and especially over the past three years of focused property search, fundraising, and building CLAM's membership and broader community support.

The location of the property is ideal for CLAM's first acquisition, putting into practice CLAM's vision of weaving affordable housing into the communities surrounding Tomales Bay. With a small addition, we are turning the house into two rental units. CLAM's first tenants moved into the two-bedroom unit on February 1, 2006. We expect to complete renovation of the 1-bedroom unit by late Spring 2006.

Many have questioned whether CLAM would actually be able to create affordable housing in the challenging high-price- and low-availability conditions of West Marin. This acquisition has moved CLAM from idea to reality. A combination of factors made it possible: a local realtor saw that this property fit with CLAM's vision and connected us to a seller who was willing to offer a slightly below-market price in return for a short escrow; we had enough money on hand from local donations and inherited assets to move quickly; and several community members stepped up to make short-term loans to secure the purchase while we completed the process for a low-interest loan from Marin Community Foundation.

With the first acquisition under our belt, our attention shifted to more firsts: determining the first rents; selecting the first residents; securing the first mortgage; putting together the first plans for remodeling the house to be two units; writing the first lease, and so on. We worked hard to choose tenants fairly and to keep rents as low as possible while enabling CLAM to pay the mortgage and other property expenses. All this work has been valuable as organizational learning for this and future projects.

We recognize that the first property acquired in 2005 is not sufficient to help everyone who needs and deserves housing they can afford. But we feel this is a start. We hope that this will be the first of many affordable housing properties that CLAM will hold in trust for the community.

# **Next Steps to Expand Affordable Housing**

The 3rd Annual CLAMbake was held in May 2005 as a thank you to members and friends and an opportunity for new people to get acquainted with CLAM. With a title of "Want to Talk Housing Solutions?" the CLAMbake featured a community conversation on creative options for expanding affordable housing. Possibilities explored included promoting second units, soliciting bargain sales, inquiring with owners of vacation and underused homes, conducting a survey of housing stock and needs, advocating housing policy changes, and publicizing mechanisms for seniors to stay in their homes while donating them.

In July the CLAM board, staff, and active member volunteers met to further develop the ideas that were raised at the CLAMbake. We decided to focus on two initiatives: 1) conduct a survey of housing stock and needs to understand more specifically who needs housing in our area and what possible opportunities might be present with existing housing stock, and 2) prepare and disseminate materials showing various mechanisms for donating or selling property to CLAM with tax benefits to the sellers. These projects are on the drawing board for 2006.

## Members, Friends, and Institutional Supporters

CLAM's membership grew to 189 in 2005, including 155 members who live, work, or volunteer in the communities surrounding Tomales Bay and 34 friends who are local businesses/organizations or individual supporters from outside the CLAM area.

#### **Finances**

CLAM appreciates the generous support from members and friends who donated \$14,604 to sustain the organization and \$70,905 to purchase property in 2005. We acknowledge and thank these people below. We were also delighted to receive support from Marin Community Foundation for the first time this year with a \$10,000 grant for operations and a \$350,000 low-interest mortgage loan. We also appreciate Marin County's renewal of our operating support grant for the third time to help with the

demands of our first property acquisition. The financial statement below shows income, expenses, and balances for 2005.

Toward the end of 2005 we launched a capital campaign to raise \$175,000 to ensure affordable rents at our first property, fund the construction, and replenish the property acquisition fund for the next opportunity. By February 2006, we have raised \$130,000 in donations toward this goal. We will be completing this capital campaign during 2006.
